So while Anne is the original writer and creative author, Otto Frank served as the editor and publisher, making decisions about which passages to include, how to structure the narrative, and how to protect the identities of others.

# The Dual Role: Anne as Author, Otto as Editor

Understanding the dual nature of authorship is essential. Anne herself began editing her own diary in 1944 after hearing a radio broadcast by the Dutch government-in-exile calling for personal accounts of the war. She envisioned a published book titled *Het Achterhuis* (The Secret Annex) and started rewriting passages, removing some entries, and polishing her prose. This gives us two distinct versions: her original diary (often called version A) and her revised version (version B). After the war, Otto Frank combined these and further edited the text, removing sections he considered too personal or potentially harmful to others. In 1947, the first Dutch edition was published, titled *Het Achterhuis*. The edition that most readers encounter today, especially the “Definitive Edition” released in the 1990s, restores much of the previously omitted material—including Anne’s candid thoughts about her mother, her sexuality, and her conflicts with the others in hiding.

Thus, the “author” of the diary as a published work is a collaboration between Anne and Otto. For legal and copyright purposes, Anne Frank is the author, but the editorial decisions made by Otto have shaped the text that the world has read for over 70 years. This collaborative authorship is a central theme in literary scholarship about the diary.

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## THE JOURNEY OF THE DIARY: FROM SECRET ANNEX TO GLOBAL PHENOMENON

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To truly appreciate the role of the author, we must explore the diary’s journey. Anne received the red-and-white checkered autograph book as a birthday gift on June 12, 1942. She immediately began writing in it, addressing her entries to an imaginary friend named Kitty. The diary served as a confidante, a creative outlet, and a historical record. When the family went into hiding on July 6, 1942, the diary was one of the few personal possessions Anne brought.

During her 25 months in hiding, Anne wrote consistently. She documented the daily struggles: the fear of discovery, the limited food, the constant tension between the eight inhabitants, and her own emotional development. She also expressed hope, love for nature, and her dreams of becoming a writer. Her last entry was on August 1, 1944. Three days later, the Gestapo raided the annex and arrested everyone.

After the arrest, Miep Gies and Bep Voskuijl, the Dutch women who had helped hide the family, gathered the diary sheets and kept them in a desk drawer. When Otto Frank returned to Amsterdam in 1945, the only survivor of the annex, Miep gave him the papers. Reading his daughter’s words for the first time, Otto was struck by her depth and her desire to become a journalist or author. He decided to fulfill her wish by publishing the diary.

Otto Frank initially faced rejections from Dutch publishers who felt the diary was too ordinary or too painful. Eventually, the historian Jan Romein wrote a positive review that sparked enough interest, and the Dutch publisher Contact published 3,000 copies in 1947. The book gained traction, and by 1952, an English translation titled *Anne Frank: The Diary of a Young Girl* was released in the United States and the United Kingdom, becoming a bestseller. The diary has since been translated into more than 70 languages and is required reading in many schools worldwide.

The success of the diary is due largely to the unique voice of its author. Anne Frank wrote with an honesty and clarity that transcends her young age. She did not write a typical war memoir; she wrote a coming-of-age story that also serves as a testament to the human spirit and a stark warning against hatred and persecution. The diary's author, Anne Frank, has become a symbol of the millions of children who died in the Holocaust, and her words continue to inspire new generations.

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## CONTROVERSIES AND MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT THE AUTHOR

The 1955 play and 1959 film, for instance, heavily rely on the edited version by Otto, and some critics argue that these adaptations softened Anne's character, removing her more rebellious or sexual self-reflections. The restored "Definitive Edition" published in 1995 brings back much of her original voice, offering a more complete picture of the author.

Furthermore, there has been debate over whether Anne Frank should be considered a literary "author" in the traditional sense. She wrote only one book (though she also wrote short stories and essays), but the quality of her writing is often compared to that of adult authors like Anaïs Nin or even Dostoevsky in terms of introspection. Many literary scholars classify Anne Frank as a major author of the 20th century, not merely a historical figure.

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## THE AUTHOR'S LIFE AND DEATH: CRUCIAL CONTEXT FOR THE DIARY

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Understanding Anne Frank as an author requires understanding her life before and during the Holocaust. She was born into a liberal Jewish family in Germany and moved to the Netherlands in 1933 after the Nazis rose to power. She attended a Montessori school, had many friends, and was known as an outgoing, talkative, and precocious child. In 1940, Germany occupied the Netherlands, and restrictions against Jews intensified. By
