WHO SHOULD CONSIDER (AND AVOID) THIS DIET?

The **800 Cal A Day Diet** is primarily intended for individuals who need to lose weight quickly for health reasons. Typical candidates include:

- People with a

body mass index (BMI) over 30.

- Individuals with type 2 diabetes or prediabetes who wish to achieve remission.
- Patients scheduled for bariatric surgery who need to reduce liver size prior to the operation.
- Those under direct supervision of a doctor or registered dietitian.

However, the diet is not suitable for:

- Individuals with a BMI below 25 or those who are at a healthy weight.
- Pregnant or breastfeeding women.
- People with a

- Individuals with significant kidney stones or gallbladder issues.
- Children and adolescents.
- People on certain medications (e.g., insulin or blood pressure drugs) without dose adjustments.

If you fall into any of the contraindicated categories, consider a more moderate calorie deficit of 1,200–1,500 calories per day instead.

SAMPLE 800 CAL A DAY MEAL PLAN

While meal replacements are

common, a whole-food version of the **800 Cal A Day Diet** is possible with careful planning. Here is a sample day that emphasizes protein and low-calorie vegetables:

- **Breakfast (200 calories):** Two scrambled eggs with spinach and a small handful of cherry tomatoes. Black coffee or unsweetened tea.
- **Lunch (250 calories):** Grilled chicken breast (4 oz) with a large mixed green salad (lettuce, cucumber, bell peppers) dressed with one tablespoon of balsamic vinegar and a teaspoon of olive oil.
- **Dinner (250**

calories): Baked salmon (3 oz) with steamed broccoli and cauliflower (2 cups) seasoned with lemon and herbs.

- **Snack (100 calories):** One cup of unsweetened almond milk or a small apple with a teaspoon of peanut butter.

Total: approximately 800 calories. Note that this plan lacks carbohydrates and may not meet all micronutrient needs. A multivitamin and omega-3 supplement are often recommended.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS ON AN 800 CAL A DAY DIET

healthcare provider decide that the **800 Cal A Day Diet** is appropriate, follow these guidelines to maximize safety and outcomes:

1. **Hydrate**

adequately:

Drink at least 2–3 liters of water daily to help with hunger, prevent constipation, and support fat metabolism. Add electrolyte supplements if needed.

2. **Prioritize**

protein: Aim for at least 60–80 grams of protein per day to protect muscle mass. Include eggs, poultry, fish, tofu, or high-quality protein shakes.

3. **Use fortified meal**

replacements:

Products designed for VLCDs contain a balance of vitamins and minerals. Do not rely solely on whole foods without supplementation.

4. **Monitor for side effects:**

Check blood sugar if you have diabetes, and report persistent dizziness, nausea, or weakness to your doctor.

5. **Incorporate light activity:**

Gentle walking or yoga is fine, but avoid intense exercise until you adjust. Listen to your body.

6. **Plan the transition:**

Gradually reintroduce calories over 2–4 weeks. Adding 200–300 calories per week while focusing on whole foods can help prevent rapid regain.
