The goal was to achieve a state of "passivity" or "accessibility," where the actor is completely open and reactive, with no mental blockages preventing the flow of organic action.
- The Encounter:** The ultimate goal of the work is not the performance itself, but the **encounter** between actors, and between the actor and the audience.
